#### The Camino Chronicles: A 500-Mile Adventure

Three Septuagenarians Take on Northern Spain

What began as a pre-dawn dash to Gatwick Airport on April 25th would become the adventure of a lifetime for three intrepid walkers, averaging 70 years. Their destination: the legendary Camino Frances, stretching 500 milés across northern Spain from the Pyrenees to Santiago de Compostela.

#### A Soggy Start in the Mountains

After catching the 6:50 am flight to Biarritz, the trio made their way to St. Jean Pied de Port, nestled in France's dramatic Pyrenees. Here, the adventure took an immediate turn for the dramatic—and damp. Two of the men trudged through torrential rain to their mountain accommodation, while Bob, claiming "no rooms available" (wink, wink), graciously were volunteered to join them the following morning.

What should have been breathtaking mountain vistas became a comedy of meteorological proportions. Visibility dropped to a mere 10 yards through fog, rain, mist, and clouds, while temperatures plummeted to a bone-chilling 4°C. So much for balmy Mediterranean weather! This delightful pattern persisted for 17 of the trio's first 20 days, turning their Spanish adventure into what felt more like a Scottish Highland trek.

#### The Human Tapestry of the Camino

While the weather tested their resolve, the

people they encountered restored their spirits. The trail became a fascinating cross-section of humanity: including effervescent South Korean women who brightened everyone's day with their infectious energy, and Americans grappling with political uncertainty-some made redundant by the new administration, others contemplating emigration. One particularly poignant encounter involved a Mexican-American woman, fearful of deportation despite her full citizenship, whose husband stayed home rather than risk re-entry complications.

The Camino proved to be a genuine United Nations of the walking world, with fellow pilgrims from Australia, New Zealand, Ireland, South Africa, Norway, Sweden, Indonesia, and beyond. As one of the trio later admitted, these international conversations proved far more stimulating than their own increasingly limited repertoire after weeks of each other's company! 6



#### Sheer Coincidence

In the middle of a very wet day the trio took shelter in a leanto that have benches for Pilgrims to rest. Here they were joined by a couple who asked where they were from? England, oh, where in England, Near Nottingham, oh whereabouts? Near Newark, Oh! Whereabouts do you two live then? Fiskerton! Kevin and Vicky are walking to raise funds for Alzheimer's, and guess what Kevin does . . . takes on projects from charities and the like to build community centres , conversations to be expanded on both teams' return. #### Architectural Marvels Along the Way

Between the raindrops, spectacular sights emerged. Ancient churches and cathedrals stood as testament to centuries of pilgrimage, while former homes carved directly into rock faces sparked imaginations. One village featured dwellings so whimsically integrated into the landscape they resembled hobbit homes from Middle Earth. The opulent Bishop's Palace in Astorga provided a particularly striking contrast to their modest pilgrim accommodations.



#### Culinary Adventures (And Misadventures)

The gastronomic journey consisted primarily of tapas and pinchos depending the region of Spain you may be in, with an endless parade of cold sandwiches and pre-prepared omelettes, often "enhanced" by microwave warming. However, the occasional hot meal became a cause for celebration, with the communal dinners at the Albergues (pilgrim hostels) ranking among their finest culinary experiences.

Nature's Daily Symphony

Despite the challenging weather, Mother Nature provided daily compensation. Spectacular displays of wildflowers lined their path, accompanied by an ever-changing soundtrack of birdsong. Most memorably, cuckoos seemed to follow their progress, providing a morning wake-up call that became as reliable as any alarm clock. Wildlife sightings ranged from remarkably vocal toads to majestic storks nesting atop church towers, culminating in a rare glimpse of a Pyrenean Eagle soaring overhead.

#### The Final Push to Glory

approach Santiago The to de Compostela should have been a triumphant victory lap, but reality had other plans. After weeks of covering 17-20 miles daily, the toll injuries became evident: accumulated, a chest infection took hold, and exhaustion set in. The final photograph may show three men at journey's end, but it barely conceals the profound weariness of their monumental achievement.

#### Legacy and Looking Forward

Their epic journey raised approximately £1,000 for ASK Hive funds through JustGiving donations and share purchases. The trio thank





all those who contributed, with a special acknowledgment to Benchmark Consulting for their generous financial support throughout the adventure.

As for future adventures? That remains a topic for future discussion—preferably after they've recovered feeling in their feet and forgotten the more challenging moments of their 500-mile odyssey. After all, memory has a wonderful way of polishing even the roughest experiences into golden adventures worth repeating.

#### ASK Garden Club Report Spring 2025

Rachel Barrowcliffe came to the garden club to aive นร а Tropical presentation the on Butterfly House Sheffield. near Rachel's role includes planning,

design implementation, creating award winning gardens, supporting wildlife, maintaining plants and animal enclosures over the 7.5 acre site.

In the winter of 2021/22 a new butterfly house was built standing 8 metres high and opened on the 31<sup>st</sup> March 2022. The old greenhouse has now become the tropical bird house. An outdoor area for the café was developed where the car park had previously been as a larger outdoor seating area was needed following the Covid 19 pandemic. The new butterfly house contains a large pond heated to 28 degrees supporting a giant water lily and is surrounded by many tropical plants including bananas, hibiscus and clivias.

In 2024 the new butterfly house won the BIAZA 2024 Gold horticulture award.

There are now over 200 species of tropical plants in the butterfly house; Rachel uses a high potash fertiliser to encourage flowers. Many of the plants are bred specifically for the butterflies. By propagating



plants from seed, cuttings and division, Rachel ensures a constant supply of plants to support the breeding of the butterflies.

#### **ASK Garden Club Report Continued**

The tropical butterfly house is well known for the Glass Wing (greta oto) butterfly which are very difficult to breed. They are shipped in from abroad as a pupa.

Further breeds include the Zebra butterfly, Broadwing butterfly, their host flower being passiflora caerulea (passion flower) and the Swallowtail butterfly which is also prevalent in the summer months. Another moth on





site

is

the Atlas moth which has a 12 inch wingspan, is the largest in the world and its sole purpose is to breed.

Other residents at the park include iguana, crown pigeons, owls, ducks, finches, stick insects, scorpions, guinea pigs, terrapins and much, much more!

A woodland walk where hellebores, snowdrops, bluebells, ransoms (wild garlic) and cyclamen can all be found here in spring taking advantage of the light before the summer leaf canopy casts the area into shade. There are 50,000 snowdrops, many having been rescued from building sites across the area. These are a very important nectar source for early bees. Over 1000 tulip bulbs are planted for flowering at Easter and there are around 50 fruit trees.

Our next meeting is on the 22<sup>nd</sup> July when we will be visiting 'Waxwings & Goldcrest' two architect designed eco-homes in Bestwood Village set within 6 acres of stunning, tranquil gardens developed with biodiversity in mind. There is also a wildness walk through where grass snakes can be found and a witch's potion garden where many of the plants have healing and medicinal properties.

In addition to the tropical bird and butterfly houses the park boasts multiple picnic areas, a dinosaur trail, farm barn and a play park for the children. Opening times and prices are available on the website which is <u>www.butterflyhouse.co.uk</u>

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#### **PROGRESS?**

After a delay, in part as a result of the County Council elections, a proposal was received from the manager of the project to develop the site that showed that The Hive would be left with a very small patch by the car



park and trees, rather than about half

the site! This is plainly not in the spirit of the agreement reached with the County Councillors and Administration in December or subsequently in February, which was published as a press release by them! The ASK Hive team believe this may be a fishing expedition to see what the Council can sell on to developers for building on, and have responded saying this is **NOT** acceptable. Our local Cllr. Sue Saddington and former council Leader Cllr. Sam Smith are perusing this with the administration as the new leadership have cancelled all meetings and oversight committees for at least a month. We have also written to the new Leader Cllr. Mick Barton expressing our concerns, and await a response. We will probably have to await the formation and appointment of the new council officers possibly until after the August recess!

The ASK Hive team are asking locals to express their opinion directly to the new leader to draw attention to the situation, especially after four years of chipping away at this fantastic opportunity for our Cllr. Mick be community. Barton contacted can at cllr.mick.barton@nottscc.gov.uk (extracted from the Notts CC website).

The team hope this is just a hiccup and will keep you informed as communication is re-established with the new leadership and its members.

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
